

WHO WE ARE

Marian Homes, Inc. is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization formed by St. Mary of Sorrows Knights of Columbus Council 8600. It was incorporated in Virginia in 1996 with the expressed purpose of owning and maintaining group homes for persons with intellectual disabilities.

HOW IT BEGAN

The goal to purchase a group home began with a vision by the St. Mary of Sorrows Council leadership to provide an opportunity for persons with intellectual disabilities to live in a family-like, group home environment. After four years of planning, persistence and prayer, and with the advice of the Fairfax County Community Services Board, Marian Homes purchased its first house in the Brecon Ridge subdivision of Fairfax. In 1998, Marian House was dedicated and five women, previously residents of the Northern Virginia Training Center, began their journey of independent living by moving into our first house. Over the next ten years, numerous improvements were made to the house, including addition of an all-season sunroom for the residents and caregivers.

In 2012 the Department of Justice and the Commonwealth of Virginia, reached a final settlement in U.S. District Court, to "create or expand a range of supports and services to individuals with [intellectual disabilities or developmental disabilities] and their families." With this settlement and the plans to close the Northern Virginia Training Center by May 2016, our strategic business plan dramatically changed. Marian Homes' future faces the possibility to acquire a home a year for the next four years to help place some of the remaining NVTC residents.

OUR ORGANIZATION

Marian Homes is administered by the Board of Directors elected from the K of C Council 8600 membership. Board members serve on a voluntary basis, typically for three years. Board members apply their extensive professional and personal experience to the ownership and maintenance of the group home residences. None of the Board of Directors are paid and most of the legal and administrative expenses to date have been provided pro bona, with the exception of formal annual audits conducted by a certified auditing firm.

OUR PARTNERS

From its inception, Marian Homes has enjoyed a close working relationship with Chimes of Virginia, a subsidiary of the Chimes Foundation, a major international non-profit corporation focused on programs supporting persons with intellectual disabilities. Our Chimes of Virginia relationship began with an introduction by the Fairfax County Community Services Board

OUR FUTURE

Marian Homes continues to be a one of a kind initiative within the Knights of Columbus. Council 8600 was the first Council within Virginia to establish an organization to own and maintain a group home. Marian Homes has made it a priority to expand this program to other Councils in the state because of the recognized need for group homes. We have teamed with KOVAR to expand our outreach.

Since March 2010, Marian Homes, with the help of the Fairfax CDBG, has purchased three additional houses, located across the county. The homes are named "Marian House", "Regina House" "Queen of Peace", "Mother of Mercy" and "Our lady of Light.". Marian Homes has completed the conversion of our fifth home (see photos) to be ready for occupancy in June 2017, providing homes for 25 intellectually disabled adults.

FUND RAISING

Marian Homes receives rental payments from the care provider of services to the residents. Beyond that income, our financial wellbeing is completely dependent on voluntary donations. In the past, we have received yearly grants from our sponsoring Knights of Columbus Council and the St. Mary of Sorrows parish and individual pledges from members of Council 8600. We are fortunate to have received loans and grants from KOVAR, the state-level Knights of Columbus organization focused on programs supporting persons with intellectual disabilities. We have typically conducted annual fundraisers including a dinner gala, bingo nights and Casino nights. We are also proud to announce the recent approval of Marian Homes for inclusion in the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) in the National Capital Area and three other CFC campaigns in Maryland and Virginia. Our CFC donating number is 16658.
